However, this does not mean that black protagonists are over-averaged disabled. The inability of seeing refers more to a special type of blindness: a psychical one. This kind of disablement is a matter of the construction of [the] inner eyes, those eyes with which [one] look[s] through [the] physical eyes upon reality (Ellison, Ralph. Invisible Man. London: Penguin Books, 1965. p.7). It is a way of refusing to recognise people and their character traits, which African Americans were often confronted with. This ignorance of the - mainly - white society is picked out as a central theme in many African American novels and, therefore, it will be the topic of this publishing.
